
RUMMAGE SALE PLANNED

Please drop off donations in the Fellowship Hall's Healing Room for now. Thanks!!!




SLC members enjoyed Sunday lunch out at Sakura in Franklin with Kim May, following her talk on authenticity on a recent Sunday.

Deter Snakes from your Yard

SnakeAway and mothballs do not work!
According to experts, we are just wasting our money. And in some states like Florida, it is illegal to place mothballs outside. So what can we do? They do not like the smell of ammonia, so it's good to keep some in a spray bottle when you want to encourage a snake to move on.

Proactive steps include keeping your grass mowed short and your landscaping plants trimmed as most of their predators come from above. Stack wood well away from your house and don't let debris piles accumulate. Bird feeders attract snakes because they attract rodents as well as birds. They need water so beware of standing water like puddles and ponds and be cautious in damp areas.

No Wrong Door Is Helping Our Community in So Many Ways

No Wrong Door for Support and Recovery provides support for those who are transitioning from detention or treatment facilities by enlisting the aid of Peer support, Pastoral ministries and Municipal and Community Organizations as well as other agencies and providers who support and assist persons suffering from substance use and/or mental health challenges.

No Wrong Door also provides support for family members who have been affected by a loved one's struggles and community-based peer support and

education.

Their director Shiela Jenkins took time out from her busy schedule to meet with members of the Heart Centered Book Club to thank them for their volunteer efforts and explain more about the program. She said that where they see a need in the community, they try to find a way to meet that need. The Downtown Door is a good example of that. The facility located at 381 East Main St. in Franklin provides comfortable shelter for the unhoused on cold nights in addition to their regular services as a free daytime place to shower and do laundry, obtain clothing, counseling and psychological support.

No Wrong Door offers *Prime for Life* and *Prime Solutions* for inmates at the Macon County Detention Center. These programs are geared towards those who want more effective prevention, education and treatment services.

Evidence based practices (EBP) help reduce the risk of health and impairment problems related to substance use while maintaining ongoing remission from substance use disorders.

No Wrong Door offers peer-led groups for male and female population at the Macon County Detention Center including: WRAP Skills, Parenting with Love and Logic, Peer Support, One on one and group sessions, and Alcohol and Drug Assessments.

Additional services include One on One Support from a Peer Support Specialist, Drug and Alcohol Counseling, Recovery Education Groups, Resource Navigation for Detox and Rehabilitation, Sharing Our Stories Support Group, Wellness groups such as Wellness Recovery Action Plan (WRAP), Prime for life, Love and Logic Parenting Class, Creative Recovery, Walking group, Woodworking, and Veterans Purpose Social.


