Uses for a Leaky Hose

There's no need to throw out a rubber or vinyl hose just because it has sprung a leak. Here are two uses for it in the garden.

- 1. Turn it into a soaker hose. Seal the "male" end of the hose with a cap, available for not much at your garden center. Use a nail to punch a series of holes along the length of the hose, or just in the areas you want. Use it in the vegetable garden or curl it around the base of a thirsty shrub and cover all but the "female" end with mulch.
- 2. Cut one foot sections of hose and lay them wherever earwigs, sow bugs, or slugs are a problem. The bugs will crawl into or under the hose at night, and you can easily collect them during the day. Just drop them in a bucket of soapy water.
